

Thursday, the last day of the convention, included presentations by John Drengenberg (Safety Researcher from Underwriters Laboratory in Illinois), Grafton Fire Chief Bill Rice (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System-MABAS), North Shore Fire Chief Bob Whitaker (Shared Services), and Retired MFD Deputy Chief Neil Lipski (Deep Tunnel Rescue). Each of these speakers shared their expertise in their related fields. John Drengenberg was joined by Milwaukee Fire Department Lt Jeffrey Freitag in a discussion about the research UL completed in Milwaukee with houses that were built with knee walls. Racine Fire Chief Steve Hansen, an IFBA member, added comments to both Chief Rice's and Chief Whitaker's presentation. Neil Lipski, father of current MFD Chief Aaron Lipski, brought back memories for Bill Mokros when he needed to go into the tunnels in Milwaukee as a photojournalist. All of these presentations were extremely interesting.



Rachel and I took a quick drive over to Milwaukee in mid-August for the 70th Anniversary of the International Fire Buff Associates Convention. Out back, a new pole building housed a few pieces, and behind that, outside housed Engines along with an old MFD Tiller. It was really too bad to see these rigs sit out in the elements, but hopefully they'll go back into the new pole building that was being completed.


I've made alot of new friends, that's for sure.


